We were thrilled to be able to rename and rededicate the Elkhart inpatient facility as "Esther's House" in honor of Dick's mother, who was one of our patients.

On September 23, we hosted our 10th Annual Bike Michiana for Hospice and 33rd Walk for Hospice. This marked the first time both of these signature events took place together on our Mishawaka Campus. The weather was flawless, and the event provided a great opportunity to connect more people to the work we do and the cause for which they were riding and walking - more so than ever before.

Picture-Perfect Weather for Bike Michiana/ Walk for Hospice

September 23 turned out to be one terrific day. It started with a cool morning and continued into a bright, sunny day with a light breeze and 72 degrees. Not a bad start for the 10th Annual Bike Michiana for Hospice (BMFH) and the 33rd Annual Walk for Hospice (WFH). There were two exciting changes to these signature fundraisers: it was the first time the events were held on the same day, and it was the first time the bike event started and ended at CHC's Mishawaka Campus, adjacent to Central Park.

"We felt it was important to bring people together on our beautiful campus in Mishawaka and let them see all that is happening here," said Mike Wargo, chief operating officer for the Hospice Foundation. "By hosting BMFH on our own campus, along with Walk, we gave people the opportunity to connect more closely with the cause for which they are riding or walking."

The joint event saw many other exciting changes. BMFH was revamped to include

three new routes, new restaurant partners, and an easier check-in process. This was also the first year that registration in advance of both these events was required – a practice which helped control costs and streamline the process.

"With any fundraiser, it's important to balance costs with revenue," said Peter Ashley, director of communications and annual giving for the Hospice Foundation. "By requiring advance registration, we were able to better plan for food and other elements of the event that ultimately made it a more effective fundraiser, while improving the day-of experience for registered participants."

A post-event survey revealed that more than 94% of participants plan on returning for the 2019 event, which will take place on Sunday, September 8. Look for more details and registration information soon.

Center for Hospice Care's Veterans Memorial Rededicated as the *Captain Robert J. Hiler Jr.* **Veterans Memorial**

In 2016, Center for Hospice Care (CHC) dedicated a beautiful Veterans Memorial on the grounds of our Mishawaka Campus. As a "We Honor Veterans" Level 4 Partner, CHC takes great pride in meeting the unique needs of veterans facing lifelimiting illnesses. As CHC President/CEO Mark Murray notes, "Today, one out of every four Americans dying is a veteran. Our goal is to address their end-of-life needs, to serve them as they have served us."

Due to an incredible gift from the Robert J. Hiler Family Foundation, and John and Catherine Hiler, CHC was able to rededicate the memorial as the *Captain Robert J*. Hiler Jr. Veterans Memorial. "The ceaseless generosity of the Hiler family has made a huge difference in our community," said Murray. "Their support of our work and of veterans specifically means that we will be able to continue our veterans programs entry arbors and "Poppies," the into the future."

The renaming of the memorial took place on October 16, 2018 during our annual Veterans Tribute Ceremony. The event, which was attended by more than 150 people, was a wonderful opportunity to remember and honor loved ones who have served this country.

"Although it was only the second year we have held the veterans tribute ceremony, it is becoming one of my favorite events," said Mike Wargo, chief operating officer of the Hospice Foundation. "As a veteran, seeing so many people in our community come together to honor other veterans is very meaningful. The rededication and renaming of the memorial after Robert J. A LOOK BACK A Celebration 25 Years in the Making

Most kids don't go to camp to talk about grief, but at Camp Evergreen, that's the whole point. It may sound strange to some, celebration to represent the Linda Lloyd but this camp focuses on helping children cope with the loss of a loved one and to feel less lonely during the process. It's common for kids to feel isolated and alone when a loved one dies, not always having the vocabulary or emotional maturity to talk about their feelings. This year, the camp celebrated its 25th anniversary of supporting grieving children across Center for Hospice Care's nine-county service area.

To celebrate this special anniversary, more than 125 people gathered in the Pepsi Stadium Club at Four Winds Field on August 9 for a reunion. They shared laughs and memories while cheering for the South Bend Cubs. A total of 60 campers and their family members as well as 37 volunteers

were in attendance. As special guests, five members of the Lloyd family joined the Mission Endowment for Camp Evergreen, which provided the funding to enable this camp to thrive for years to come. Guests reminisced about their time at camp over hotdogs and hamburgers and shared stories of the loved ones they continue to hold dear in their hearts. They were able to peruse photo albums and view a video that brought back fond memories.

Thanks to the Linda Lloyd Mission Endowment, Camp Evergreen continues to give kids a safe place to talk about their experiences and to learn coping mechanisms from trained adult volunteers as well as other campers. And after 25 years, the camp has helped 1,006 kids and engaged 589 staff and volunteers.

For 35 years, Center for Hospice Care (CHC) has been honoring deserving recipients with our Helping Hands Award. We are excited that the 2019 Helping Hands Award recipient is Catherine Hiler – a true community servant and long-time supporter of CHC and the Hospice Foundation.

The award will be presented during our annual Helping Hands Award Dinner, which will be held at the Hilton Garden Inn on Wednesday, May 1. This year's event is being co-chaired by Kurt Janowsky and Stephanie and Todd Schurz.

Catherine was born in Belfast. Ireland and emigrated to the U.S. with her parents and two brothers. After spending several years in San Francisco working at First Interstate Bank of California, Catherine moved to Washington, D.C., where she served as an advisor to the Committee on Government Relations for the House of Representatives. She also served as Executive Director for both the Federal Mine Safety and Health Review Commission and the White House Conference on Small Business. It was in Washington, D.C. where she met her future husband Congressman John P. Hiler of Indiana.

Since living in South Bend, Catherine and John have raised three wonderful daughters – Alison, Caitlin and Morgan, and have served the community in many capacities. Catherine served on The Stanley Clark School Board and was a parent representative on the John Adams High School Committee that established the International Baccalaureate magnet program

We like to believe that Catherine found her true passion when she began her involvement with CHC and ultimately, the Hospice Foundation. Catherine has been involved with our organization for more than 16 years. She started as a volunteer and served on the boards of CHC and the Hospice Foundation, including five years as board chair. If that were not enough, in 2014 Catherine graciously agreed to chair our five-year comprehensive fundraising campaign *"Cornerstones for Living: The Crossroads" Campaign.*" This campaign, now in its final months, is focused on raising money to build a new 12-bed inpatient care facility (now called the Ernestine M. Raclin House), and to endow many of our signature programs.

"I can think of absolutely no one more deserving of our 35th Helping Hands Award," said Mark Murray, President/CEO of CHC and the Hospice Foundation. "Catherine has been a tremendous asset to not only this organization, but also to the entire community. Her desire to give back has left an indelible mark."

New Palliative Care Course for Ugandan Nurses

In Uganda, as in many low-resource settings, the demand for trained palliative care providers is greater than the supply. There are currently fewer than 200 qualified palliative care practitioners providing care to an estimated 255,000 cancer and HIV/AIDS patients, as well as those suffering from other chronic diseases that cause severe pain.

Palliative care (PC) in Uganda, like hospice care in the US, offers a holistic approach to caring for patients and their families. One of the biggest differences between them is the availability of resources to offer that care. In the US, as in other high-resources settings, an interdisciplinary team made up of specially trained physicians, nurses, chaplains, social workers, home health aides and bereavement counselors is used. In Uganda, a nurse trained in palliative care typically provides all aspects of care.

Since 2013, completion of this specialized training program has been the only means through which nurses could be certified as prescribers. Developed by the Institute of Hospice and Palliative Care in Africa (IHPCA), and located in the Hospice Africa Uganda compound, this program provides specialized training for healthcare professionals who, upon graduation, deliver care much like that provided by nurse practitioners in the US.

Due to funding limitations, the program only produced a handful of graduates each year. Most of them were from more highly populated

areas of the country. To answer the need for care in other areas of the country, the Palliative Care Association of Uganda (PCAU) and Center for Hospice Care (CHC) worked together to establish a scholarship program to train healthcare professionals from rural areas. Since establishing the program in 2010, 62 nurses and clinical officers receiving PCAU/CHC scholarship funding have graduated from this year-long program. As a result, the availability of palliative care services has expanded from 34 to 94 of Uganda's 127 districts.

The unfortunate reality though is that PC is still accessible by just 10% of the population in need. Over the past three years, PCAU and CHC representatives have been working with the Mulago School of Nursing and Midwifery (MSNM) to develop a similar diploma program that can be delivered to more students at a lower cost without sacrificing the quality of instruction.

Mulago is the oldest public nursing and midwifery training institution in Uganda. It was founded by the British Colonial Government in 1955 to address and promote preventive, rehabilitative as well as curative care in Ugandan communities. The school has evolved to offer more specialized courses in order to address the growing need for specialized nurses to support specialized care offered by Mulago National Referral and Teaching Hospital.

In addition to working with MSNM to develop a program, PCAU and CHC simultaneously

advocated with the Uganda Ministry of Health (MOH) to increase their understanding of the burgeoning need for PC services. With this heightened awareness, the MOH established a strategic objective to increase PC services throughout the country. The MOH plan calls for an additional 700 practitioners to be trained to meet the gap for PC services in the country.

The addition of the Advanced Diploma in Palliative Care Nursing (ADPCN) at MSNM will help support the MOH mandate. The first cohort of 16 students entered the program in February. Another cohort will be enrolled in July.

The scholarship program developed by PCAU and CHC in 2010 will now be redirected to this new MSNM program and is expected to quadruple the number of graduates annually. In addition, PCAU will provide technical support for training tutors who will manage the course, mentor the tutors during the first year of the program and coordinate PC practicum sessions.

Since 2008, Center for Hospice Care/Hospice Foundation (CHC/HF) and PCAU have worked together to support PCAU's mission "to promote and support affordable and culturally appropriate palliative care throughout Uganda." One of the biggest challenges is Uganda's lack of nationwide

Palliative care is defined by the World Health Organization (WHO) as care at either the end of life or care after the diagnosis of a life-threatening disease that improves the quality of life for the patient and their caregivers by alleviating suffering. Worldwide, only 14% of those who need palliative care receive it. In fact, the need for palliative care is most concentrated in low- and middle-income countries, comprising 78% of the approximately 40 million people in need of palliative care on an

In Uganda, only about 10% of those in need have access to palliative care services. Numerous diseases require palliative care and stakeholders in Uganda are working hard to meet the need, including the Palliative Care Association of Uganda (PCAU). Established in 1999, PCAU is the national association for palliative care in Uganda and registered as a non-governmental organization (NGO) in 2003. It is an umbrella organization with 20 organizational and 650 individual members.

data and information regarding palliative care services in the country. Until recently, the Ugandan Ministry of Health (MOH) and PCAU relied on outdated tracking mechanisms, such as books and paper forms, that created an incomplete picture of palliative care delivery.

To overcome this data and information gap, PCAU and CHC/HF established an mHealth (mobile health) surveillance system, now in its fourth year, that uses cellular technology to collect information regarding palliative care on a consistent basis. This system is providing basic data for monitoring and evaluating palliative care services as well as comprehensive tracking and reporting of morphine distribution and use. Ideally, this will lead to increased funding for palliative care in the healthcare system once it is fully implemented throughout the country.

Other partners in this collaboration include Uganda Martyrs University, the University of Notre Dame, the MOH and selected hospital management teams. The project began as a pilot program in 2015 and is currently scaling up to a total of 20 facilities throughout the country. The mHealth program is but one example of the innovative initiatives the CHC/HF/PCAU partnership has developed to increase access to palliative care in Uganda.







Workshop Focuses on Communication Skills During Serious Illness

In September 2018, the Center for Education & Advance Care Planning brought Dr. Lyle Fettig and Dr. Erin Newton of the Indiana University (IU) School of Medicine to CHC's Mishawaka campus for our first "IU Talk." The goal of this one-day workshop was to empower physicians and nurses with the communication skills needed to discuss serious illness with their patients and families.

The workshop featured role-playing activities to practice their skills in having these difficult discussions. Fettig and Newton led the group in discussion-based interactions. IU Talk is designed to provide a collaborative atmosphere in which they could practice these discussions.

Another key component of the workshop is using actors who respond to simulated situations as the clinicians navigate new ways to begin discussions about serious illness or end-of-life issues with their "patients." This interactive approach allowed participants to understand what they were doing well, and learn new ways to address difficult situations.

IU Talk is supported by VitalTalk, a national model which grew out of research into the learnability of effective, empathetic, honest clinician communication skills. Both Fettig, who directs the IU School of Medicine

Hospice and Palliative Medicine Fellowship; and Newton, an Assistant Professor of Clinical Medicine at the IU School of Medicine and a member of the IU Health Palliative Care team. see the program as a much-needed tool for end-of-life communications training.

During the workshop many of the participants noted that while they used some steps in the end-of-life discussion models, this was the

first time they had seen a guide or process to address the issues they may face with a patient. As the result of a generous multi-year gift from the Vera Z. Dwyer Charitable Trust, the Center for Education & Advance Care Planning will continue to offer this program to area clinicians to empower them with effective communication skills in discussing serious illness and end-of-life issues.

Compassionate End-of-life care Introduced Early at the University of Notre Dame

Center for Hospice Care (CHC) and the University of Notre Dame's Ruth M. Hillebrand Center for Compassionate Care in Medicine once again joined forces in September to offer a unique one credithour course - "Introduction to Hospice and Palliative Care" – to more than 80 University of Notre Dame students. This immersive experience in the provision of end-of-life care covered a number of complex, critical topics

"One of the core missions of CHC and the Hospice Foundation is educating future healthcare providers about the concept of hospice and introducing them to the benefits that hospice and palliative care provides to those facing serious, life-limiting illnesses," said Mike Wargo, chief operating officer of the Hospice Foundation. "In addition, the seven-year collaboration we've had with the University of Notre Dame to offer this course mirrors the integrated approach to care that's the hallmark of hospice and palliative medicine.

Designed by Wargo and Dominic Vachon, Director of the Ruth M. Hillebrand Center for Compassionate Care in Medicine, the course included films, panel discussions, lectures and a mock interdisciplinary team meeting. The class was taught by an

interdisciplinary team comprising physicians, nurses, social workers and bereavement counselors as well as other hospice and palliative care staff. The course covered a variety of topics focused on how hospice and palliative care is delivered within the current healthcare system. Students were also given an introduction to the compassionate interpersonal communication skills required to care for those in need of palliative care or who are dying. Students met on one weekday evening for three hours in addition to spending an entire Saturday in the classroom.

Center for Hospice Care Becomes Commemorative Partner

Center for Hospice Care (CHC) has recently become a Commemorative Partner with The United States of America Vietnam War Commemoration whose purpose is to assist a grateful nation in thanking and honoring our Vietnam veterans and their families.

The five national objectives of the Commemoration are:

- 1. To thank and honor veterans of the Vietnam War, including personnel who were held as prisoners of war or listed as missing in action, for their service and sacrifice on behalf of the United States and to thank and honor the families of these veterans.
- 2. To highlight the service of the Armed Forces during the Vietnam War, and the contributions of Federal agencies and governmental and non-governmental organizations that served with, or in support of, the Armed Forces.
- 3. To pay tribute to the contributions made on the home front by the people of the United States during the Vietnam War.
- 4. To highlight the advances in technology, science and medicine related to military research conducted during the Vietnam War.
- 5. To recognize the contributions and sacrifices made by the allies of the United States during the Vietnam War.

The Commemoration created a Certificate of Honor Program to recognize four distinct subcategories of

Vietnam veterans and their families: (1) former, living American military POWs from the Vietnam War as listed by the Department of Defense; (2) immediate family members of American military personnel listed as missing and unaccounted for from the Vietnam War by the Department of Defense; (3) immediate family members of a veteran who is listed on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C.; and (4) surviving spouses (at the time of death) of veterans who served in the U.S. Armed Forces at any time during the period from November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975, regardless of location.

A key component of the recognition is the Vietnam Veteran lapel pin. Any living United States veteran who served on active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces at any time during the period of November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975, regardless of location, is eligible to receive a lapel pin. The lapel pin has an eagle surrounded by stars and stripes encircled by a laurel wreath with the words Vietnam War Veteran. On the back is the message "A Grateful Nation Thanks and Honors You."

CHC will be performing certificate presentation and pinning ceremonies to patients and families throughout the year as well as at special events honoring veterans. A Permanent Home in Elkhart County

One of the most significant accomplishments over the past 10 years was the opening of our seven-bed inpatient care facility in Elkhart. Tucked away just north of the US 20 bypass and CR 17, Center for Hospice Care's Elkhart Campus is a wonderful example of the warm home-like setting CHC inpatient units provide patients and their loved ones.

It was made possible through the generosity of numerous Elkhart donors, particularly Dick and Rita Strefling. After experiencing the compassionate care Dick's mother Esther received from CHC both in-home and in our inpatient care facility in Roseland, the Streflings were committed to ensuring that families had access to the same level of care in Elkhart County. In 2007, the Streflings, through the Strefling Foundation, provided the lead gift to make that a reality.

In honor of their generous gift, and to celebrate the 10-year anniversary of the Elkhart Campus, the inpatient facility was renamed "Esther's House" and officially rededicated on August 16, 2018.

An Amazing Place to Be

Cyril "Bud" Stone became a patient in April of 2010. He had been removed from a respirator and the family thought it would only be hours before he passed. That hadn't happened, and they were advised by the hospital that they would have to take him home or to our inpatient care facility. Karen Parsons, one of Bud's seven children, said their family just wanted her father to be able to die in peace.

"Home wasn't an option," she noted. Her father had endured years of pain due to back injuries and arthritis and, while everyone marveled at how tough he was, they also knew it was only a matter of time before he passed. They wanted to be able to share time with him as a family, in a quiet setting. "He received the very best of care in the short time he was at Hospice House," she added.



"I think the staff are God's angels on earth," Karen said.

Since the opening of our Elkhart Campus, more than 1,086 families have experienced the compassionate care Dick and Rita Stefling envisioned.

Creating a Centralized Hospice Campus

On August 20, 2013, Center for Hospice Care (CHC) and the Hospice Foundation officially welcomed the public to its new Mishawaka Campus. During a news conference at the time, President/CEO Mark Murray noted, "This facility, this location and this remarkable pastoral setting is not only a testament to a tremendous collaboration between Mishawaka and Center for Hospice Care, but also a tangible example of the incredible growth experienced by the philosophy of hospice care." None of these accomplishments would have been possible without the generous support of our community and the collaborative nature of the City of Mishawaka. Donors have made gifts of all sizes to further our mission to improve the quality of living. Mishawaka leaders have helped us improve the quality of our community. By working together, CHC and the city have been working to transform our campus location into something in which we can all take pride. The riverfront along which our campus sits is now home to the recently renovated Central Park, miles of walking paths and other amenities.

To help ensure adequate funding for the consolidated campus, CHC and the Hospice Foundation launched *"Cornerstones for Living: The Crossroads Campaign,"* our largest fundraising campaign in history, in July of 2014 (see page 44 for a campaign update).





Impact of a Consolidated Campus \$260,000 saved per year

Given the growth over the years of CHC in terms of patients and staff, additional office space was required each year. To accommodate these needs, CHC was renting thousands of square feet of space in multiple locations around the city. It became clear that it no longer made sense to continue leasing more and more space. The time had come for CHC to own our facilities. The consolidation of space has many obvious benefits, not the least of which is a significant annual cost savings – savings that help our mission to serve all those eligible in our community – regardless of their ability to pay.

Consolidated Campus **Efficiencies**

The consolidated campus CHC is building has had and will continue to have a positive impact on our patients, families and community. Bereavement clients have been able to avail themselves of our services in a beautiful setting; CHC staff have benefitted from working more closely together; and soon, hospice patients will be able to experience the soothing sounds and views of the St. Joseph River. By working closely with the City of Mishawaka, CHC and the Hospice Foundation strive to be "good neighbors" and are committed to improving the quality of living for everyone with whom we come into contact.









An Enduring Commitment to Veterans

Center for Hospice Care (CHC) is proud to be a Level 4 "We Honor Veterans" partner. A collaborative effort between the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization, this program provides focused end-of-life care for those who served in the armed forces. As a Level 4 partner, CHC integrates veteran-specific content into its staff and volunteer orientation and education as well as offering veteran pinning ceremonies and assisting our patients' participation in honor flights. Thanks to generous donors, we were able to establish an enduring tribute to veterans. The Veterans Memorial, located on the Mishawaka Campus was dedicated in 2016. A "Veterans Tribute Ceremony" is held annually to dedicate donated bricks and plaques. The first such ceremony took place in 2017 and featured Medal of Honor Recipient Spc. 5 James McCloughan as our special guest.

One Soldier's Story

One particular story captured the hearts of our donors and supporters, and truly embodied the "We Honor Veterans" program. WWII veteran Wilbur Lewis entered our care in the spring of 2016. His family described him as a vibrant, "charismatic character" – a man who loved life. Making the decision to choose CHC enabled his daughter and son-in-law, Karen and Rich, to bring him into their home and helped ensure his final months of life were the highest quality they could be.

CHC was able to send one veteran on an honor flight to Washington, D.C. – to provide an opportunity to visit the memorials honoring their service and sacrifices. Wilbur was the right choice



for the Honor Flight, which left in the early hours of the morning and returned late that same night. Little did he know that hundreds of supporters were awaiting him when the return flight landed. "We celebrated overseas when the war ended, but when we came home it was nothing like this – it would have been so nice to have received this kind of welcome when we came home."

Engaging Our Community to Support Charity Care

Everyone has the right to receive compassionate, dignified end-of-life care – and money should never be an obstacle to receiving this type of care. That's why Center for Hospice Care (CHC) made a promise in 1980 that no one eligible for hospice care would be turned away due to an inability to pay. "We mention this promise often because our commitment to providing these services, regardless of one's ability to pay, is one of the driving forces behind our fundraising efforts," said Mike Wargo, chief operating officer of the Hospice Foundation. "This generous community has enabled us to keep that promise – and we intend to continue fulfilling that commitment into the future."

Thanks to the ongoing generosity of our many supporters, we have been able to keep that promise. In the last five years alone, CHC has provided nearly \$10 million in unreimbursed and discounted patient care and bereavement services to thousands of people throughout our local community.

All donations – large and small – contribute to keeping this promise to the community. As the largest hospice provider in Indiana, CHC is privileged to be able to support the community in this way. In fact, our 2017 Annual Appeal focused specifically on funding for charity care through the recently established "Sister Carmel Helping Hands Fund," created in honor of Sister Carmel Marie Sallows C.S.C., our 34th Helping Hands Award recipient.

Much of what we do is bring members of our community together. Not simply to raise money to support CHC, but also to provide an opportunity for people to learn about the programs we provide to the community that have helped so many. Nothing brings people together like a great event, and over the years, the Hospice Foundation has had the privilege of hosting many well-received ones. These events have been as meaningful and touching, as they are fun and informative and focus on supporting the mission of CHC and the constituencies we serve across our nine-county service area.

Over the years, CHC has also benefited from numerous fundraising events held by other organizations. These groups, many photographed here, create their own signature events that engage the community and raise money. These proceeds are generously donated to the Hospice Foundation to support the work of CHC. On May 9, 2017 the Community Foundation of St. Joseph County held its second Give Local St. Joseph County, a 24-hour giving event. With 67 charities participating, CHC topped the list of charities for the largest amount of money raised at \$528,000.

Journeys in Healing

To raise both money and public awareness of After Images, the Hospice Foundation held the inaugural "Journeys in Healing Art Exhibition" in June 2017. The event brought more than 175 people to CHC's Mishawaka Campus, many of whom bid on 12 extraordinary pieces of art created and generously donated by participants in the program.

After Images is directed by Dave Labrum. A licensed mental health counselor, he holds a Master of Science in Counseling from IU South Bend and a Master of Fine Arts from the University of Michigan. Over the past 25 years Dave has created art counseling programs for organizations that address a multitude of mental health issues and has specialized in providing grief counseling at CHC for the past 18 years.



One Journey

Felicia and Sean O'Brien's healing journey began as they were grieving the loss of their infant daughter, Issa. They found that participating in the After Images art counseling program allowed them to effectively express their feelings of profound loss. They learned that healing - like art - is a process. "Healing occurs through externalizing things. Regret, pain, and unhappiness weigh on you as you grieve. To turn the hardest, ugliest feelings into color, texture, movement and make them into something beautiful is cathartic," recounts Felicia. Felicia and Sean generously shared their story during our inaugural "Journeys in Healing" art exhibition and auction in 2017.

Educating our Community on End-of-Life Care "This amazing gift puts CHC at the forefront

"One of the principal focuses of Center for Hospice Care (CHC) and the Hospice Foundation is educating future healthcare providers about the concept of hospice and introducing them to the benefits that hospice and palliative care provide to those facing serious, life-limiting illnesses," said Cyndy Searfoss, director of education and collaborative partnerships. This focus on education extends to educating the community about end-of-life issues.

This mission led us to create the Center for Education & Advance Care Planning. The center helps make talking about end-of-life concerns easier - easier for professionals advising patients or clients, easier for those thinking about their own wishes, easier for those who have loved ones near or at the end-of-life.

Provider Education

As the demand for hospice care continues to grow, so does the need for adequately trained medical staff. A generous gift from the Vera Z. Dwyer Charitable Trust in the form of a dollarfor-dollar matching grant up to \$1 million will ultimately establish a permanent endowment to fund the Vera Z. Dwyer Fellowship in Hospice and Palliative Medicine.

This gift will enable us to fund one physician annually in this one-year, post-residency program in perpetuity. Due to the critical need to increase physician training in hospice and palliative medicine, the trust is also providing a gift of \$100,000 per year for five years to fund one physician per year immediately. Our first fellow, Kayla Herget MD, completed her rotation in May 2018.

In addition to helping educate board-eligible hospice and palliative care physicians, the foundation provides continuing education in end-of-life issues for providers. Last fall, Dr. Lyle Fettig and Dr. Erin Newton of the Indiana University (IU) School of Medicine led the first "IU Talk" (see page 16).

The goal of this one-day workshop was to empower physicians and advance practice nurses with the critical communication skills needed to discuss serious illness with their patients and families.

Community Education

The gift from the Vera Z. Dwyer Charitable Trust also included a gift of \$250,000 over five years, enabling the Center for Education & Advance Care Planning to develop community education programs.

These programs take many forms - from providing forums to watch and discuss the PBS Frontline documentary "Being Mortal" – to hosting discussions about end-of-life over decadent chocolate creations. The underlying goal of all of these efforts is to normalize conversations about the end-of-life and encourage every adult in the community to complete his/her advance care directives.

In addition, CHC is also part of a community-wide consortium providing education, tools and resources to assist people with advance care planning. Honoring Choices[®] Indiana – North Central is a not-for-profit organization whose mission is to proactively engage people in our community in conversations with their loved ones and medical providers about their goal for quality of life and advance care planning. Honoring Choices[®] Indiana – North Central is part of a 13-state network that shares information, resources, and best practices. The partners engaged in the organization include hospitals, health systems, community groups, employers, educators, social service organizations and faith communities.

CHC, the Hospice Foundation and the University of Notre Dame's Ruth M. Hillebrand Center for Compassionate Care in Medicine come together every 18 months to offer a unique one credit-hour course - "Introduction to Hospice and Palliative Care" (see page 17).

The course covers topics focused on how hospice and palliative care is delivered within the current healthcare system. Students are also given an introduction to the compassionate interpersonal communication skills required in caring for those in need of palliative care or who are dying.

"The seven-year collaboration we've had with the University of Notre Dame has had an impact on literally hundreds of students who wish to learn more about hospice and palliative care," said Hospice Foundation COO Mike Wargo. "By reaching undergraduates who are considering opportunities in healthcare, we have been able to shine a spotlight on the much-needed and continually evolving specialty of hospice and palliative medicine."

Area's Only Free-Standing Palliative Care Center

Center for Hospice Care (CHC) is committed to improving the quality of living for our patients, their families and the broader community. In addition to being the largest hospice provider in the state, CHC also provides palliative care, which is intended to alleviate the pain and symptoms associated with serious, life-limiting or chronic illness. Unlike hospice care, which is intended for patients with a life expectancy of less than six months, palliative care has no predefined time restrictions. To meet the needs of this population, CHC built the area's only dedicated freestanding facility - Center for Palliative Care as a place to offer palliative care consultation and services.

The first of its kind in north central Indiana, this freestanding outpatient clinic gives patients and families an opportunity to receive the physical, psychosocial, emotional and spiritual support necessary to improve their quality of living. In addition, palliative care can help mitigate the depression that results from receiving the diagnosis of a life-limiting condition or chronic pain. This type of depression can reduce life expectancy, according to a study published in the New England Journal of Medicine.

Patients whose pain is adequately treated tend to sleep better, eat better and communicate more effectively with caregivers

and relatives. Patient- and family-centered palliative care optimizes the quality of life by anticipating, preventing and treating suffering.

The difference between palliative care and hospice care can be confusing. The most significant difference is that palliative care patients may simultaneously pursue active curative treatment. Palliative care includes aggressive symptom management as well as emotional support and assistance. Palliative care referrals may be made by any physician, preferably at an early stage of treatment. Once a referral is made, one of CHC's physicians or nurse practitioners will examine the patient and provide a consultation on options for care. Interdisciplinary teams comprised of physicians, nurses, social workers, chaplains and home health aides confer to support the care of our palliative care patients.

By providing these services to the community, and by raising money to create a dedicated facility, the Hospice Foundation continues to support CHC in significant ways that improve the lives of those in our community.

To help make Center for Palliative Care possible, the Hospice Foundation received an incredibly generous matching gift from a local foundation. This \$500,000 gift was truly transformational and helped spur the community to action.

The Community Responds

With the \$500,000 matching gift as the impetus for action, our community stepped up in a significant way to match the full \$500,000. Through the commitment of the community, CHC and the Hospice Foundation were able to build the Center for Palliative Care on our Mishawaka Campus.

In addition, the combined \$1 Million gifts have supported the initiation and development of our community-based palliative care program.

Breathe Eazy & HeartWize

To help manage the symptoms of chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) or of maximally treated heart disease, Center for Palliative Care delivers programs designed specifically for the challenges many patients face during these illnesses.

With a focus on symptom management, our BreatheEazy program for COPD and our HeartWize program for advanced heart disease, are designed to improve the quality of living for our patients. These programs led to reduced emergency room visits and re-hospitalizations (see charts to the left).

Each program is tailored to the specific needs of individual patients and includes specialized treatment protocols, medication, and nutritional guidance designed to provide maximum comfort. Since inception, these programs have helped many patients manage symptoms and reduce suffering.



Bridging Cultures, Connecting Lives

It's been said that pain and suffering know no borders. In 10 years of partnership with the Palliative Care Association of Uganda we have found that the same can be said of compassion. Since 2008, CHC has been in partnership with the Palliative Care Association of Uganda (PCAU), whose mission is "to promote and support affordable and culturally appropriate palliative care throughout Uganda." The focus of this partnership is capacity building, advocacy and knowledge sharing.

One of the partnership's early strategic priorities was to find sustainable office space for PCAU's headquarters. In its infancy, PCAU volunteers and staff members worked from the offices of both Hospice Africa Uganda and the African Palliative Care Association. In 2012, proceeds from Center for Hospice Care/Hospice Foundation's inaugural *Okuyamba Fest*, were directed toward purchasing a facility. PCAU's long-awaited dream of having a permanent home was realized in 2013.

During the last 10 years, PCAU has also successfully supported the expansion of palliative care services to 94 out of 127 districts of Uganda. However, there







are still a number of unmet needs. It is estimated that only 10% of the Ugandan population with palliative care needs can access these services. PCAU is working with the Uganda Ministry of Health on integrating palliative care into the country's healthcare education and delivery system.

"It all started when we were partnered with Center for Hospice Care. We owe a big thank you to Mark Murray for buying into our vision," said Rose Kiwanuka, Country Director for PCAU. "The partnership has made PCAU visible, and it is the most successful partnership I've seen globally. We have learned from each other and have become brothers and sisters."

The partnership has been involved in a number of initiatives to increase awareness of the need for palliative care and train providers. These include:

Diploma in Clinical Palliative Care

this initiative through its sponsorship of scholarships in Hospice Africa Uganda's Diploma in Clinical Palliative Care program. This one-year course equips clinical officers and nurses with the skills needed to prescribe morphine and deliver palliative care. Those who complete the course return to their communities to provide these critical services. Through 2018, CHC/HF has sponsored 62 students in the program.

Okuyamba Film



Having healthcare providers specially trained in palliative care and licensed to prescribe morphine is essential to the provision of palliative care in remote areas of Uganda. CHC/HF has helped support

U.S. to support 41 hospice and palliative care programs in 13 low-resource countries around the world. GPIC officially became a part of the Hospice Foundation in January of 2017.







To shed light on the challenges of delivering palliative care in sub-Saharan Africa, the Hospice Foundation produced two powerful documentaries: Okuyamba and Road to Hope (featured on pages 37-38).

The award-winning documentary Okuyamba uses powerful interviews with some of Uganda's

leading palliative care experts. The film exposes the viewer to the harsh realities of living with life-limiting illnesses in this small, land-locked East African country, where a diagnosis of HIV/AIDS or cancer is regarded as a death sentence. These patients find better quality of life in their final days, with the help of Rose Kiwanuka and her small group of compassionate palliative care professionals. The documentary also sheds light on the tremendous work being done with extremely limited resources.

It was the success of CHC's partnership with PCAU that led the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization (NHPCO) to contact CHC and the Hospice Foundation to consider becoming the new home for Global Partners in Care (GPIC), which was created in 1999 as a response to the burgeoning HIV/AIDS crisis in Sub-Saharan Africa. Incorporated as the Foundation for Hospices in Sub-Saharan Africa, the organization now works with 41 hospice programs across the

Bridging Cultures, Changing Lives

It's said that it takes a village to raise a child. Unfortunately, many children lack a community of people to rally around them. This is seen perhaps most clearly in Sub-Saharan Africa where many children become their dying parent's primary caregiver instead of receiving care themselves. With few to no resources, these children often have to drop out of school and perform menial jobs to make a living for themselves and their ailing parent. After the parent dies, the child is left orphaned, many times without a clear next step. Our Road to Hope program has begun to fill this gap in Uganda. This fund was created to help these children by offering hope for a better future by paying for their education and related expenses and providing ongoing psychosocial, emotional and spiritual support.

The Road to Hope program was created by Center for Hospice Care (CHC) and the Hospice Foundation, which also produced an award-winning film of the same name. The goal of the film was to document the harsh realities these children face on a daily basis. "The power of these stories – at the same time heartbreaking and heartwarming – cannot be overstated," said Mike Wargo, chief operating officer of the Hospice Foundation and producer/director of the film. "We believe that once people understand the unique challenges these children face and their incredible resilience, they will be compelled to help." The program currently has 57 children enrolled; all but eight have sponsors who support them financially.

Road to Hope Fundraiser

In 2014, Chicago Med and Pretty Little Liars star Torrey DeVitto hosted a charity event in West Hollywood that raised more than \$35,000 to support the Road to Hope program. DeVitto learned



about the Road to Hope program through her role as an ambassador for the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization. She joined the crew during filming of the documentary and spent two weeks in Uganda and Kenya. According to Torrey, "When I was in Africa as part of the film crew, I got to meet some of the children in the program. The initial inspiration was a five-year-old boy named George, who had been the sole caregiver for his dying father. When his father died, he no longer had anyone to care for - and no one to care for him."



At the age of five, George was caring for his terminally ill father. After his father died, he was sent to live with his absent mother whose new family did not accept him. He was not enrolled in school and slept in the chicken coop. Roberta Spencer, CHC and Palliative Care Association of Uganda (PCAU) volunteer, and Rose Kiwanuka, Country Director of PCAU found George and used a donation of \$100 from Jim and Hilda Hanley to enroll him in a government day school which also provided a meal each school day. That was the beginning of our Road to Hope Program.

When the Hanleys heard the story upon Spencer's return to the U.S., they agreed to sponsor George's education. This would provide a more stable environment for George as well as food and clothing.

"He is a thoughtful boy, has a smile that never disappears and 'smart' in many ways, but presents challenges to us with his formal schooling," Spencer said at the time. Kiwanuka agreed to take care of him during school breaks to reduce some of those challenges. "The Hanleys have continued to support George through ups and downs, but George does know he is supported by Jim and Hilda in the United States – two people he has never seen, but is thankful to them," said Spencer. "George is now about 13 years old and has hope and dreams for his future." Many of the worries of his early life have been quieted and he can simply be a child again. This is the hope for every child in the Road to Hope Program.

Stephen joined the Road to Hope program in November of 2012 with the initial goal of becoming a clinical officer. He developed an interest in healthcare while caring for his dying mother. He was older than the typical student in the program but was recommended because he had financed

much of his own education by making and selling bricks. When not in school, he cared for his mother and arranged for others to help while he was in class. Dr. Ruta Ghandi and her husband, Dr. Vinod Chauhan, heard about Stephen's struggles and agreed to sponsor him for the remainder of his high school education. Children typically graduate from the Road to Hope program after they complete the Ugandan equivalent of high school, however, Stephen's passion to work in healthcare prompted his sponsors – physicians themselves – to continue supporting Stephen through his university education.

With their financial support, Stephen succeeded in becoming a clinical officer and worked at the clinic that helped with the care of his mother. After that, he went on to work at a hospice program in Jinja. It was then that Ghandi and Chauhan chose to sponsor another child, Tonny.

Stephen's ambitions, however, didn't stop there. He was interested in becoming a physician and had been accepted into Saint Augustine's International School of Medicine in Kampala but needed financial assistance. Once again Dr. Ghandi and Dr. Chauhan stepped up to support Stephen while continuing their commitment to Tonny. Stephen is now in his second year of medical school and is performing very well.

"Stephen is an inspiration," Spencer said. "He continues to follow up with other Road to Hope children, even with his busy schedule, and is a great role model!"











Improving the Quality of Living
