It has certainly been another busy season for the Hospice Foundation, which means the generosity of our supporters continues to transform this community. As we move into the final year of our comprehensive five-year campaign called *Cornerstones for Living: The Crossroads Campaign*, we're excited to report that we started construction on our new Mishawaka Campus Clinical Staff Building in March – one of many important projects being funded by this campaign.

Thanks to a significant lead gift, we also held a Groundbreaking Ceremony on June 12 for our new 12-bed inpatient care facility, which will be called the Ernestine M. Raclin House. The groundbreaking ceremony and what this new facility will mean for the community is this issue's cover story. Although we have begun construction on the new facilities, there are still some underfunded priorities that require additional support. Our campaign update in this issue provides more information on the specific areas for which we continue to seek funding.

We've also hosted a number of special events, all of which are covered in more detail in this issue. On October 26, 2017, we held our first Veterans Tribute Ceremony during which we dedicated the items donated in memory of or in honor of a veteran. We were thrilled to have as our guest speaker, Spc. 5 James McCloughan, who received a long-overdue Medal of Honor in 2017 for his heroic actions during the Vietnam Conflict.

On May 2, we held our 34th Annual Helping Hands Award Dinner honoring Sister Carmel Marie Sallows, C.S.C. It was truly a magical evening which you can read and see more about in the pages ahead. Center for Hospice Care and the Hospice Foundation were also pleased to host Edo Banach, the president and CEO of the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization, for a reception on July 17 and a special staff meeting the following morning. Edo spent time touring our facilities, meeting with staff, and sharing his perspective on the future of hospice care.

The Hospice Foundation, created in 2008, is also celebrating 10 years of impact and accomplishments made possible by your generosity. Our next issue of *Crossroads* will include highlights, milestones and photos of the last 10 years. We cannot thank you enough for your ongoing support that enables us to fulfill our mission "to improve the quality of living," and to continue to offer our bereavement services and programs to all those in the community who have experienced the death of a loved one.

34th Helping Hands Award Dinner Hits it out of the Park

Each year, Center for Hospice Care honors a deserving recipient with our Helping Hands Award. This year, we were thrilled to honor someone who has faithfully served our community for more than 60 years – an individual known and loved by many – Sister Carmel Marie Sallows, C.S.C. The event was held on Wednesday, May 2.

In addition to honoring Sr. Carmel with a moving tribute video, there was acknowledgement of her love of the Chicago Cubs. Throughout the evening, there were Cubs-related elements, some subtle and some not so subtle. From the video of Sr. Carmel throwing out the first pitch at a South Bend Cubs game, to the blue fabric “W” on the ceiling, to a baseball-shaped cheesecake, guests were given a memorable experience.

Mary Jane Stanley and Sister Frances O’Connor, C.S.C. served as dinner chair and honorary dinner chair respectively and oversaw a beautiful event. Given the unique impact she has made on the lives of so many in our community,

the Hospice Foundation established a permanent fund called the Sister Carmel Helping Hands Fund. Money contributed will support our long-standing promise that no one eligible for hospice care will be turned away due to an inability to pay.

This special fund gave those who were unable to attend the event an opportunity to participate in honoring Sr. Carmel. To date, the fund has raised \$100,902. With 406 registered attendees and multiple sponsors, this year’s dinner raised an additional \$194,300, which will be added to the new fund.

In just the last four years, CHC has provided nearly \$8 million in charity care, discounted care, write-offs, and unreimbursed services. We are pleased to provide compassionate end-of-life care, and we know the Sr. Carmel Helping Hands Fund will help to improve the quality of living for our patients and their families for many years to come.

Inaugural Veterans Tribute Ceremony Featured a Special Guest and a Huge Crowd

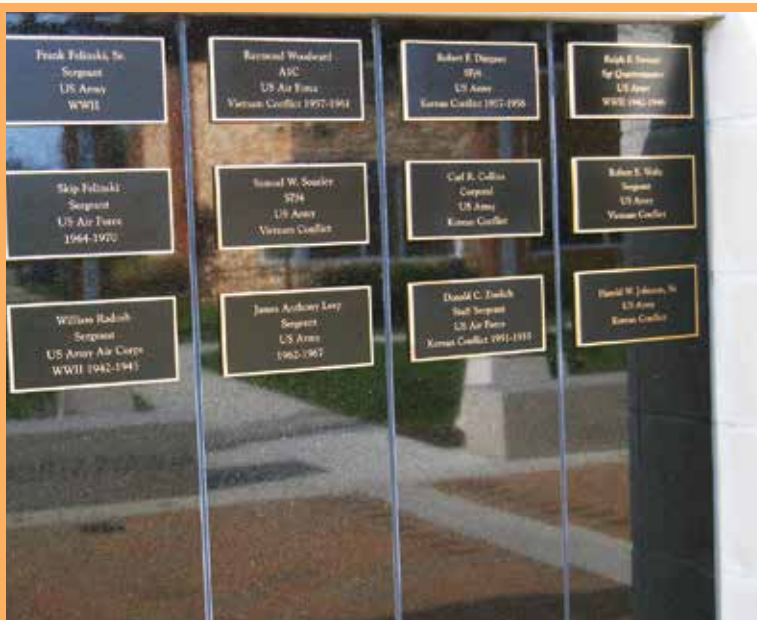
On October 26, 2017, we dedicated memorial items donated to Center for Hospice Care's (CHC) Veterans Memorial in honor of military loved ones. The standing-room-only event began with the Posting of the Colors by Miller's Vets and the Pledge of Allegiance. We were thrilled to host a very special guest for this inaugural dedication event – Medal of Honor Recipient James McCloughan, who was presented with his medal by President Trump in 2017. Spc. 5 James McCloughan became a combat medic after he was drafted in 1968, and sent to Vietnam. He was treating wounded soldiers during a battle in 1969, when he was wounded. McCloughan refused evacuation as he continued to help his injured comrades.

McCloughan began his talk by asking veterans in attendance to stand and be recognized, followed by first responders. McCloughan went on to deliver touching remarks about his service and reminded everybody that the true heroes are the ones who did not return to their families.

Larry Rice, spiritual care coordinator at CHC, dedicated the donated bricks, plaques and trees. After the ceremony, loved ones gathered to take pictures of the donated items and then attended a reception.

As a "We Honor Veterans" Level 4 Partner, CHC is pleased to create an opportunity for loved ones to honor their veterans in a special, permanent way. The Veterans Me-

memorial offers many opportunities to recognize and remember loved ones. Memorial bricks and wall plaques are available for placement at the memorial during future dedication ceremonies. There are also a number of naming opportunities available for various components of the memorial, including limestone benches, flagpoles, trees and entry arbors, as well as the centerpiece bronze statue – "Poppies" – depicting an aging WWII veteran welcoming visitors to join him on his bench. The Only Things Certain are Death, Taxes... and Chocolate?

April 16 was National Healthcare Decisions Day, a day to “Inspire, educate and empower the public and providers about the importance of advance care planning.” To promote this important day, Center for Education & Advance Care Planning (CEACP) launched its inaugural “Death by Chocolate” event to engage the community in a conversation about end-of-life planning while indulging in chocolate generously donated by local candy companies.

Facilitating these types of conversations was one of the reasons CEACP was created. As the education arm of Center for Hospice Care and the Hospice Foundation, CEACP believes it is important to discuss end-of-life issues so that families know what an individual’s

wishes are in case they are no longer able to speak for themselves. By normalizing the conversation through events such as Death by Chocolate, community members will be able to take those conversations home to their families.

Death by Chocolate began with lunch as guests discussed the thought-provoking “conversation sticks” featured at their tables. After lunch, a trivia game began with a focus on end-of-life issues. During the three trivia rounds, guests enjoyed multiple rounds of decadent chocolate and fudge desserts. The trivia featured prizes and included deeper discussion on end-of-life planning throughout the game. Attendees ranged in age from college students to retirees.

CEACP is grateful to the community-minded donors whose support made the event possible, including Kilwin’s in South Bend and Olympia Candy Kitchen in Goshen, who graciously contributed delicious confections for the event. More than 100 people gathered on the grounds of Center for Hospice Care’s (CHC) Elkhart Campus to dedicate purchased memorial items at the annual “Gardens of Remembrance and Renewal” ceremony. This event, which took place on the first Tuesday of June, provided loved ones an opportunity to honor, remember and reflect.

This event offers families a way to recognize their loved ones with a memorial brick, bench, or a flowering or evergreen tree. In total, 25 bricks, three trees and four benches were dedicated. Guests were welcomed by Chris Taelman, chief development officer of the Hospice Foundation. President/CEO of CHC and the Hospice Foundation Mark Murray also addressed the large gathering. The event concluded, as it does each year, with the reading of a litany of remembrance shared by Bereavement Counselor Debra Bledsoe.

CHC’s Elkhart Campus was designed to create a warm, inviting environment to meet the needs of hospice patients and their families. With that objective in mind, the Gardens of Remembrance and Renewal were designed to extend that feeling beyond the building. The gardens offer a quiet and peaceful respite for patients and families during their stay at the inpatient care facility.

7th Annual Okuyamba Fest was Truly a Celebration to Remember

The 7th Annual *Okuyamba* Fest took place July 31 – a little earlier than usual – and featured special guests from the Palliative Care Association of Uganda (PCAU). Country Director Rose Kiwanuka, Programs Manager Mark Mwesiga and Information & Communication Technology and Data Quality Officer Cynthia Kabagambe joined us at this year's *Okuyamba* Fest. Guests were welcomed into the event by the sound of live African drums.

The theme of the evening was a celebration of 10 years of fruitful partnership between Center for Hospice Care (CHC), the Hospice Foundation (HF) and PCAU. The event, held at CHC's Mishawaka Campus, also included authentic African cuisine provided by a local chef, as well as a stunning performance by the dance troupe Uzima. The more than 175 people in attendance experienced an event they will not soon forget.

"Our partnership with PCAU is very meaningful to us on multiple levels," said Mark Murray, President/CEO of CHC and the HF. "We have learned so much from each other over the years, and it is gratifying to be so closely aligned with an organization dedicated to improving the lives of those in their community."

CHC and HF's partnership with PCAU was developed through Global Partners

in Care. From the beginning, the union among the organizations has been mutually beneficial, allowing everyone involved to share best practices on improving access to hospice and palliative care in low-resource countries.

"It all started in 2008 when we were partnered with Center for Hospice Care. We owe a big thank you to Mark Murray for buying into our vision," said Kiwanuka. "The partnership has made PCAU visible, and is the most successful partnership I've seen globally. We have learned from each other and become brothers and sisters."

This event was also a fundraiser for PCAU and specifically for the Road to Hope program that provides support to orphaned child caregivers who were the primary caregivers for their dying parents or guardians. To help make the fundraiser more efficient, HF worked with GiveGrove, a local company specializing in online auctions. In addition to a successful silent auction, two children were sponsored in the Road to Hope program.

Prior to the official start of *Okuyamba* Fest, current Road to Hope sponsors attended a special reception to share their experiences sponsoring a child in the program. Attendees had the chance to meet with Rose, Mark and Cynthia in a smaller

setting and to hear an update from Mark on the progress that has been made. After the pre-event reception, everyone was encouraged to join *Okuyamba* Fest and enjoy the rest of the evening.

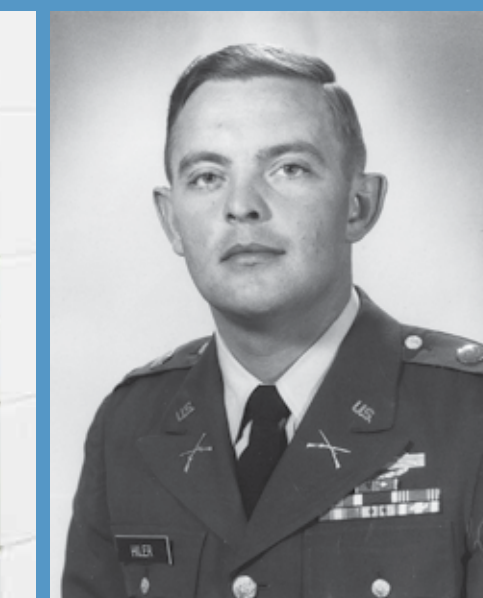
flagpoles, trees, entry arbors and "Poppies," the centerpiece statue.

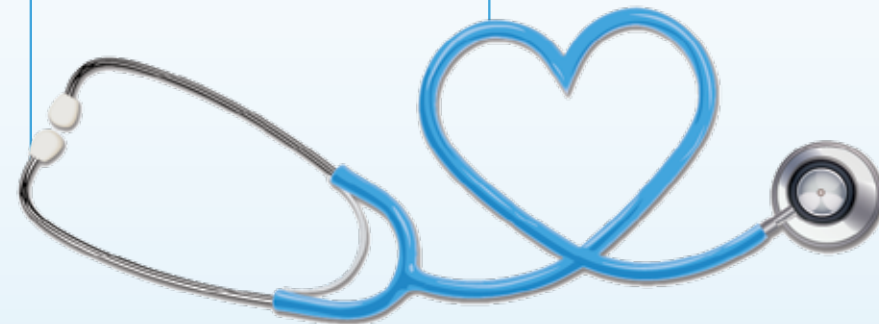

HOSPICE PARTNERSHIPS AROUND THE GLOBE

Enhancing Access to Palliative Care Globally

The Global Partners in Care (GPIC) team spent the end of 2017 and early 2018 engaged in a strategic planning process to ensure the organization is moving forward by focusing on its strengths and opportunities for improvement. Beginning with a reaffirmation of the core mission to establish and support international partnerships to enhance access to palliative care worldwide, the team followed a deliberate process that included input from partners and stakeholders.

GPIC's Partnership Program has paired hospice and palliative care organizations in the U.S. with international sister organizations for nearly 20 years. Since its inception, the goal has been to establish mutually beneficial relationships that not only provide tangible support for palliative care in low-resource settings, but also foster the exchange of ideas and shared learning for both partners. Partners engage in capacity building, education, fundraising, technical assistance and so much more. Cultural learning and exchanges foster personal and professional growth, and many partners develop friendships that last a lifetime.

In addition to establishing partnership pairings, GPIC has added two areas of focus: strategically engaging in research and education, and raising awareness and

advocacy through global collaborations.

These additions will further our mission of enhancing palliative care globally.

Partnership Impact Story

Building strong, sustainable partnerships is at the core of our work. The longtime partnership between Helderberg Hospice in South Africa and Hospice of the Western Reserve (HWR) in Ohio is just one great example.

Helderberg Hospice, one of the first hospices in South Africa, provides comprehensive healthcare to people living with life-limiting illness through partnerships – both in the local community and internationally. Their partnership with HWR started in 2002 and has grown over the past 16 years. The partnership goals include encouraging the exchange of information, technical assistance and support between the organizations, as well as providing monetary contributions to Helderberg Hospice.

Exchange visits between the partners help foster a strong relationship, with visits typically scheduled every two years. Helderberg Hospice CEO Gail Sykes and Events/Media/Marketing Coordinator Patricia McNaught Davis visited HWR in September 2015. They spent time with team members and were

able to incorporate some of what they learned in their own organization. During their visit, Gail and Patricia presented a large framed collage of pictures of their staff. This collage now hangs in the HWR conference room in Cleveland, Ohio.

HWR staff reciprocated with a visit to South Africa in 2017. Sykes noted that it's important for HWR staff to visit and work alongside her staff to best learn about Helderberg's work. This helps to cultivate relationships on a personal level which results in fostering a deeper mutual understanding of the two organizations.

Our Partnership with the African Palliative Care Association

While overseeing bilateral partnerships is an important aspect of our work, we also have a long history of collaboration with the African Palliative Care Association (APCA). A key focus of this engagement has been supporting palliative care education for nurses and social workers in Africa. The African Palliative Care Education Scholarship Fund enables nurses and social workers to receive palliative care training.

APCA was founded in 2004 to help facilitate the collaborative work of national associations,

governments and palliative care providers to expand the provision of palliative care. They have had a significant impact on the growth of culturally appropriate palliative care on the continent. In addition to supporting palliative care education, GPIC works with APCA to assist national associations in Africa. Two national associations are part of the GPIC Partnership Program: The Palliative Care Association of Uganda and the Kenya Hospices and Palliative Care Association.

The African Palliative Care Education Scholarship Fund

Palliative care education is vital for nurses and social workers who provide healthcare for the vast majority of people across Africa. Especially in rural areas, nurses and social workers are often the only providers available. Equipping them with specialized training is crucial to enhancing access to palliative care.

In 2011, GPIC and APCA created the African Palliative Care Education Scholarship Fund. The students funded by the program also provide palliative care education to a diverse audience (e.g. policy makers, healthcare workers and the general public). The knowledge and skills they gain enable them to provide quality palliative care services to adults and children with life-limiting illnesses, along with their families. Since its inception, the African Palliative Care Education Scholarship Program has supported palliative care education for 30 practitioners from 10 African countries.

Empowering the Future in Uganda

Since its inception in 2011, the Road to Hope Program, jointly administered by Center for Hospice Care/Hospice Foundation (CHC/HF) and the Palliative Care Association of Uganda (PCAU), has given orphaned children who cared for their dying parents a support system to see them through to a productive adulthood. Because of generous sponsors, the program has been able to provide tuition, school fees, supplies, uniforms and other necessities, often in a boarding school environment. Perhaps more importantly, Road to Hope has also given the 57 children currently enrolled in the program (and previous enrollees) psychosocial, emotional and spiritual support through regular visits by the full-time program coordinator and through its summer camp program.

Roberta Spencer, a CHC/HF volunteer whose work with the program has been invaluable, saw a new need arise as the students enrolled in Road to Hope got older. “It became apparent that more time was needed to focus on the older children in the program who are approaching, or in, their teen years. We needed an opportunity for those in Primary Seven through secondary school and/or vocational school to clarify their goals and values to reach their full potential, empower them with life skills to deal effectively with the challenges in everyday life and to develop their leadership skills.”

This opportunity became an Empowerment Retreat, which was held at the end of January,

before the students were to begin their new school year. It was held over three days – the theme was “I Know Who I Am... I’m Special.”

PCAU engaged another organization, called GEN, to assist in running the camp. The word GEN is a north African tribal word meaning “hope,” which is certainly a fitting connection to the Road to Hope program.

The curriculum they developed was divided into three skill-building parts:

- knowing and living with one’s self;
- knowing and living with others; and
- effective decision making.

Within these three areas, the group also covered self-awareness, self-esteem, coping with emotions, financial management, forming friendships, peer resistance and relating to the opposite sex. Individual counseling sessions were also offered.

Morris Aheebwe was one of the retreat participants. In speaking of Morris, Roberta noted, “You can’t help but like this young man. He is one of the older teens in the program and always has a smile. He struggled academically, but remained in school, doing his best. He has a kind heart and looks out for younger children. Morris is in his last year of training to become a mechanic and wore his mechanic jumpsuit over his other clothes during the retreat. He is and will be a strong mentor for other children.”

Since 2008, Center for Hospice Care (CHC) and Hospice Foundation (HF) have had a partnership with the Palliative Care Association of Uganda (PCAU) through Global Partners in Care. From the beginning, the union among the three organizations has been mutually beneficial, allowing everyone involved to share best practices on improving access to hospice and palliative care in low-resource countries.

HF and CHC were thrilled to welcome Rose Kiwanuka, the Country Director of the Palliative Care Association of Uganda (PCAU) for a visit in late July. It was a special trip for a number of reasons, not least of which was the partnership celebrating 10 years.

The visit coincided with the 7th Annual *Okuyamba* Fest (see pages 12-13) that took place on July 31– a little earlier than usual – and featured other special guests from PCAU. In addition to Rose, Programs Manager Mark Mwesiga, and Information & Communication Technology and Data Quality Officer Cynthia Kabagambe joined us for the event.

During their visit, Rose, Mark and Cynthia also attended numerous meetings and events. They met and had breakfast with CHC staff in Elkhart, Plymouth, South Bend and Mishawaka; held sessions with our University of Notre Dame partners, including meetings to discuss the mHealth initiative; met with partners at IU

South Bend; and attended several HF events, including the celebration of 25 years of Camp Evergreen at a South Bend Cubs game.

“I wish I had known about hospice sooner.” That simple – but compelling – sentence is something Center for Hospice Care (CHC) staff members hear too frequently. That comment, and similar ones served as the impetus for the new education arm of CHC, Center for Education & Advance Care Planning (CEACP). In providing hospice and palliative care services, we see daily evidence that as a society, we prefer to ignore the inevitable, which is that we will all die. When end-of-life issues arrive – and they will – patients and their loved ones often face a myriad of questions and concerns. While 70% of us say we would prefer to die peacefully and painlessly at home surrounded by our loved ones, the reality is that 70% will die in a medical setting such as a hospital, nursing home or other long-term care facility.

according to research conducted by the Dying Matters Coalition and the Centers for Disease Control.

Normalizing conversations about the end of life allows people to think calmly and clearly about their wishes, and to convey those wishes to their loved ones and professional caregivers. CEACP is developing a number of initiatives to encourage the community to have proactive end-of-life conversations in a relaxed, engaging way. “Death by Chocolate,” which combines chocolate, trivia and conversation starters about end-of-life is one example. (See story on page 10 for more details.)

As the education arm of CHC, the center also works with medical professionals and trusted advisors to prepare them to have

end-of-life conversations with their patients and clients. In September, CEACP will host a program called “IU Talk.” This two-day workshop, based upon the national program called VITALtalk, will provide a facilitative environment for physicians to practice high-yield skills to better navigate difficult conversations.

Other educational initiatives planned include a series of continuing education courses for those engaged in end-of-life work including social workers, financial advisors, attorneys and accountants.

Delivering high-quality, compassionate care to all eligible regardless of their ability to pay has been and will continue to be a driving force behind what we do. Improving our facilities and increasing our capacity to care for patients are critical components of this mission.

Thanks to many generous supporters and donors, Center for Hospice Care (CHC) and the Hospice Foundation were able to consolidate leased space from around the area into a new multi-phased campus in Mishawaka. In 2013, the

The event drew more than 100 people to our Mishawaka Campus, including Mrs. Raclin, her daughter Carmi Murphy,

and son-in-law Chris Murphy, who made remarks during the event. Complete with gold shovels and a ceremonial dig, the groundbreaking ceremony was a celebration of the generosity of this community and of Ernie Raclin, as well as the future of hospice care in our community.

“The Ernestine M. Raclin House will be a symbol of comfort for thousands of future patients,” said Mark Murray, CHC President/CEO. “By expanding our inpatient capacity in such a beautiful facility along the St. Joseph River, Mrs. Raclin and all our supporters are cementing a legacy of compassion and care.”

The Raclin House and the Clinical Staff Building should be finished in late 2019. When completed, this five-acre campus will be a symbol of comfort, care and community for all the areas we serve.

Donor Profile: Ernestine M. Raclin

Community Leadership Exemplified by Grace, Energy and Focus

Transformative. This word encapsulates Ernestine Raclin's generous gift to Center for Hospice Care's (CHC) comprehensive campaign, *Cornerstones for Living: The Crossroads Campaign*. In a broader sense, the word "transformative" captures Ernestine Raclin's imprint on endeavors throughout her eventful life. Her transformative leadership is evident in the business community, in education, in economic and community development, in the arts, in service organizations, in health care and philanthropy.

As a result of her gift to CHC, a new 12-bed inpatient hospice facility, to be named the Ernestine M. Raclin House, is being constructed on CHC's Mishawaka campus. It will be situated along the St. Joseph River in a way that provides each patient room with a picturesque riverfront view. The focus of the new inpatient care facility is to provide an additional layer of compassionate, specialized hospice care in a warm, home-like setting.

An eventful and productive life

Ernestine Raclin was born on October 25, 1927 in South Bend to Ernest and Ella (Keen) Morris. She learned about business from her father, who founded The Associates and later acquired an ownership stake in a local bank that would ultimately come to be known as 1st Source Bank. Ernestine or "Ernie" followed her mother's lead on supporting social services, and she continues this tradition of philanthropy established by her parents. During the fall of 1946, she married Oliver C. "Mike" Carmichael, Jr. After serving in

the U.S. Navy, Carmichael worked in business and transitioned into higher education administration. He became president of Converse College in Spartanburg, South Carolina in 1956. They had four children, and moved back to South Bend in 1960 when Mike assumed leadership of The Associates.

During this time, Ernie's career was that of wife, mother and community volunteer. She cared deeply about her community and the people in it. And she consistently worked to make it better. She assumed leadership roles as a volunteer, and this began Ernie's series of "firsts."

- First woman trustee, University of Notre Dame.
- First woman to chair a Notre Dame campaign.
- First woman to sit on First National Bank of Chicago board.
- First woman to chair the IU South Bend Advisory Board.
- First woman to serve on the board of directors of NIPSCO, People's Energy and MidCon.
- First woman to serve on the South Bend Regional Chamber board.
- First woman to chair the Project Future board of directors.
- First woman to head a United Way campaign in the U.S. (1972 and 1973).
- First woman director, United Way of America.
- First woman treasurer, United Way Board of Governors.

This list of firsts highlights just a few of her numerous achievements and leadership roles.

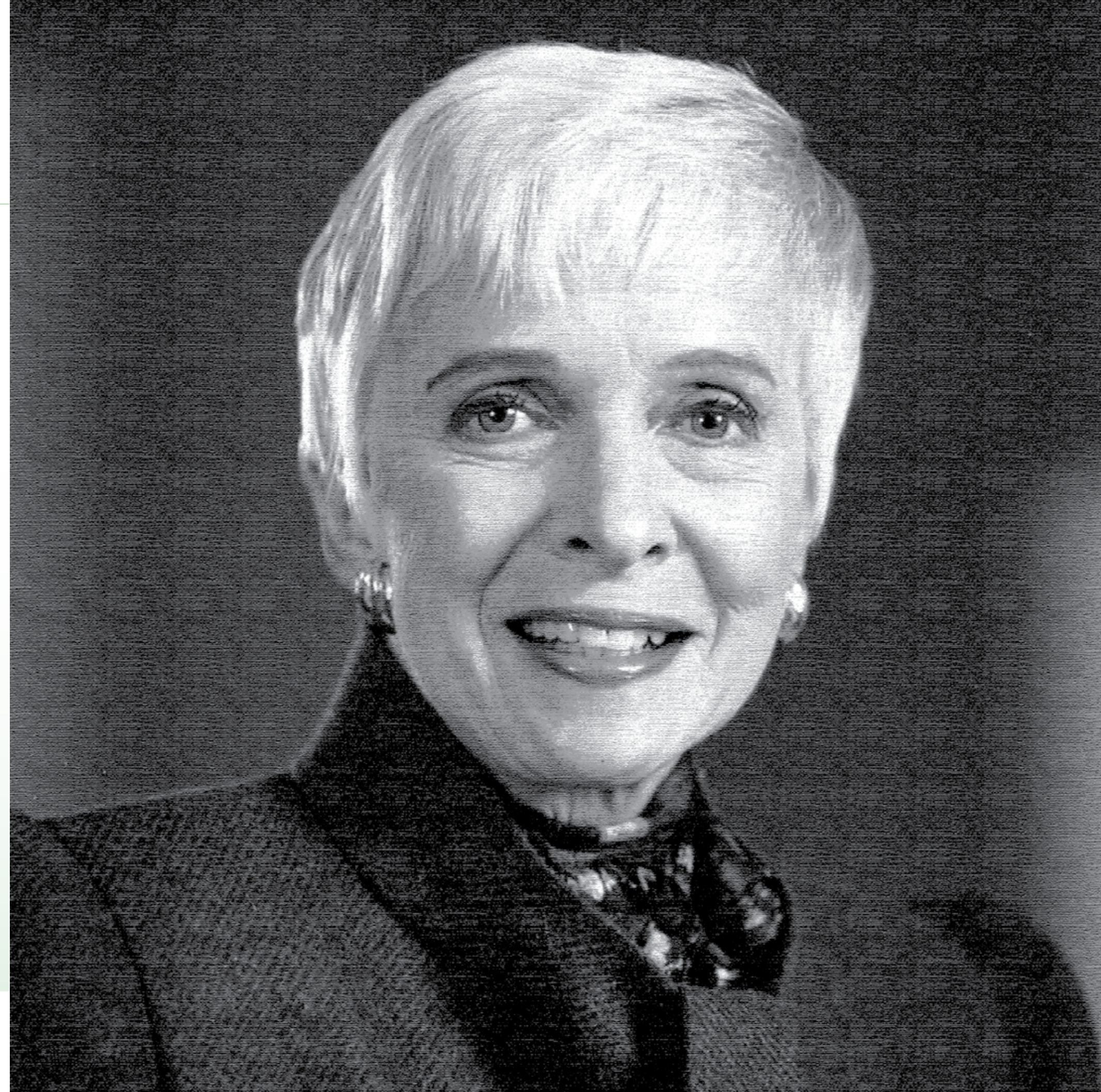
Tragically, Ernie's husband Mike passed away unexpectedly in 1976 at age 56 and she assumed chairing the board of the family's business interests, now known as 1st Source Corporation and 1st Source Bank. She led 1st Source as chair, along with her son-in-law, Christopher J. Murphy III, who served as 1st Source president and CEO, until her retirement in 1998, when he became Chairman.

Ernie married Bob Raclin in the late 1970s and they enjoyed their shared interests in family, business, travel, community service and philanthropy until Bob's death in 2008.

Her community service has been celebrated in many ways and by many organizations throughout the community over the years. Center for Hospice Care presented its Helping Hands Award to her in 1987. She was a member of the dinner's steering committee in 1991 and 1992 and served as dinner co-chair in 1995 when her close friend JoAnn Meehan was honored.

"Center for Hospice Care's ability to care for nearly 400 people each day is greatly enhanced by Ernestine Raclin's lead gift to build a new inpatient facility. We can't thank her enough for this generous support," CHC President/CEO Mark Murray said.

Ernie's leadership in business, community and philanthropy cast a stunning array of accomplishments to celebrate and admire, and the Ernestine M. Raclin House will be a lasting physical representation of her eventful life – improving the quality of living – in a transformative way.
